Head of School News October 11, 2021

#### Admissions:

#### Development

• The Annual Fund is ahead of where it was in October 2021

• This includes a number of gifts that have come in honor of Bill Probsting.

• The Golf Outing on September 20th had 67 golfers registered. 85 people attended the cocktail hour. Though there were fewer golfers than the previous year, in every other category the 2021 outing exceeded last year's numbers.

• Special thanks should be extended to Janet Stevens for spearheading the effort and Tim Latimer for taking the lead in organizing and liasoning with the Riverton Country Club. Lily Taylor was an organizing wonder. Daniele Lucas with help from Colin Lucas were also extraordinary in their help. Other parents who provided help as members of the committee were Mandy and Steve Sigman and Kristin LoSassos.

• This is grant writing season, Lily Taylor has completed and submitted grants for the D'Olier Foundation to support the Burlington County Scholars Fund, the Ellis Family Foundation to support the Burlington County Scholars Fund, and the Tyson Fund to underwrite the remodeling of the Lower Level of the Main Building to support expanded art programing and provide a well-appointed science lab and classroom

#### COVID-19

• All Faculty have been vaccinated against COVID-19 or completed the exemption process

#### Personnel

• We hired an additional assistant for the PreSchool - Allison Mailley.

- Janeen Smith has agreed to serve as interim Director of the Preschool until the return of Jess Durdin from her maternity leave

• Most school employees completed CPR/AED training and certification during the In-Service on Friday 10/8. A side benefit of the training was that Cinnaminson Fire and Rescue did the training, meaning they got to know us and we got to know them

• Still Needed

o School Counselor- We will have one in place by October 25th.

#### Facility:

• The fence work around the main playground (behind the auditorium) was completed. This means we no longer have any temporary orange fencing and we have provided better separation between students and cars within the campus. The final side of the fence along the property line the runs parallel to Hilltop Road will be completed with the next round of security funds • The Preschool play yard got a much needed freshening with new mulch and grading over the long weekend.

• We are working with Haines Garden Center to provide us with large planters each season

• For the solar project we are waiting on bids for a new roof on the sections of the building that will have the panels and that were not a part of the Gym/Auditorium and Atrium work from 2007. The cost of the roof would be rolled into the financing and increase the kilowatt hour cost by a bit. This would lower our overall anticipated savings for electricity but allow the school to replace a roof past its 30 year life at a very favorable price and finance plan. We will make a final decision on whether or not to go forward with this project once we have all the information.

• The Main Building lower level project consisting of the two new art spaces, science prep room, and new science class room is still almost completed. Supply chain issues mean that we are still waiting on cabinets for the art room, new stools for the art room and countertops in the science room and prep room.

#### **Program and Parents**

• We will hold a series of low key BYOC play dates each of the next Saturdays. On 10/16 the BYOC will be for Preschool parents and children, on 10/23 Prek-5th grade will have their BYOC on 10/30 Parents and Guardians Council will hold a trunk or treat for all grades.

• 8th grade students wrote new queries for the school for the month of October, these remain focused on integrity.

 We are slowly developing regular jobs for students: 8th grade is responded.

• We are slowly developing regular jobs for students: 8th grade is responsible for picking up the playground each morning before heading into classes. 1-3 grade students are now assigned jobs to wipe off tables and get them ready for the middle school students. 4th and 5th grade students are to clean the playground at the end of recess. 7th grade students are now to keep the flowers watered. We are about to start a rotation of grades doing a once a week trash pickup on the campus. We are about to start a lunch food waste reduction challenge.

• Students continue to learn new songs from the new songbook. Some are in preparation for the revamped Thanksgiving Meeting for Worship which will feature six songs.

• We have had two speakers this fall. Vedra Chandler, WFS alum spoke to students about her journey from WFS including being in the traveling Broadway production of Hair and a member of the international cast of Cirque Du Soleil. Now she and her family have returned to her Camden Home where she works to help the arts serve social justice work. Most recently she helped bring the New View Camden Project together. The students loved signing with her and having her sing to them. The second speaker was Bobby Trice of the Friends Committee on National Legislation. He shared with students what FCNL does, how it moves its work forward. Most interesting to the 5th-8th grade students was his discussion of how he came to work at FCNL and which issue most speaks to him and he would like to see move forward.

• Second Grade students are now involved in the picture book study of the Global Read Aloud. This year's artist illustrator is Duncan Tonituah. His work aligns nicely with Latinix American Month. One of his books is a biography of Sylvia Mendez whose case fighting school segregation paved the way for *Brown V Board of Education. Separate Is Never Equal: Sylvia Mendez and Her Family's Fight for Desegregation* (Jane Addams Award Book (Awards)) [Tonatiuh, Duncan]

• 6th and 7th grade students with Valerie Parry and Carl Abramowitz are reading *Barren Grounds* by David Robertson as a part of the Global Read Aloud. They are focusing on the history of treatment of First Nations Children in Canada as well as First Nations resilience and resistance.
